



The Word of God

People And blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever.

Amen.

The Celebrant may say

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

When appointed, the following hymn or some other song of praise is sung or said, all standing

The Collect of the Day

Almighty and everlasting God, you have given to us your servants grace, by the confession of a true faith, to acknowledge the glory of the eternal Trinity, and in the power of your divine Majesty to worship the Unity: Keep us steadfast in this faith and worship, and bring us at last to see you in your one and eternal glory, O Father; who with the Son and the Holy Spirit live and reign, one God, for ever and ever. A reading from the Book of Genesis (1:1-2:4a)

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day. And God said, "Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." So God made the dome and separated the

waters that were under the dome from the waters that were above the dome. And it was so. God called the dome Sky. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

And God said, "Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. Then God said, "Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees bearing fruit of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it." And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." And it was so. God made the two great lights-- the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night-- and the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth, to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.

And God said, "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky." So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.

And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind." And it was so. God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth."

So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation. These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created.



All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.







A Message from the Clergy and Vestry of St. Luke's

REOPENING THE CHURCH

At long last, the Governor of Florida and the Episcopal

Diocese of Florida have determined that with proper mitigation, churches can begin a phased process that allows congregational worship. Thanks be to God!

The reopening of St. Luke's, as well as all churches, will require somewhat of a resetting of expectations. Requirements set forth by both governmental and diocesan leaders is provided below.

PHASE I

St. Luke's has been operating under the provisions of what is now known as Phase I, the suspension of congregational worship, since the third Sunday in March. Thankfully, Phase I provisions allowed the gathering of up to ten (10) people, so we were able to conduct live, online services to help meet our spiritual needs during this difficult time.

PHASE II

Effective Sunday, May 31st, 2020, St. Luke's will once again open its doors for congregational worship. Services will be held at both 9:00 AM and 11:00 AM. Our return to worship will require us to adapt to changes set forth by both Ron DeSantis, Governor of Florida, and John Howard, Bishop of Florida. Parishioners with underlying medical conditions that make them more susceptible to infection or those who feel that they have potentially been exposed to the coronavirus should continue to worship online for the safety of themselves and others. Specific guidance for our return to worship is provided below. This guidance incorporates state and diocesan requirements and considers St. Luke's specific needs as well.

Taking of Temperatures — Everyone's temperature will be taken with a noncontact thermometer prior to entering the church or parish hall.

Wearing of Masks — All those attending worship services are required to wear masks (cloth or paper). Everyone is asked to bring their own mask, but a small quantity will be available at the door.

Hand Sanitizer - Hand sanitizer will be available at the doors of the church and parish hall for use upon entering and exiting the buildings.

Social Distancing - All parishioners are asked to maintain the six feet social distancing requirement established by the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

Nursery - The nursery will not be available for childcare during Phase II but parishioners, if desired, may certainly bring their children with them to church.

Seating — Seating will be limited to two per pew, with every other row closed for use. Families, those living together under a single roof, will be allowed to occupy the same pew without regard to this requirement.

Overflow- If attendance for a service exceeds seating guidelines, overflow be directed to the parish hall where the service can be viewed on closed circuit television.

Parishioners with Underlying Medical Conditions — Parking, for those at higher risk that would prefer to participate in the worship service using their smart phones, etc., will be reserved in the area at the rear of the church (behind the Labyrinth). Holy communion will be provided by a member of the clergy at your car at the appropriate time.

Choir- Choir activities, as a group, remain suspended during Phase II in accordance with diocesan guidance. Choir members will be seated with the congregation as indicated above.

Lectionary- All readings will continue to be done by the clergy.

The Peace — Everyone is reminded that the exchanging of the

Peace will remain non-contact.

Eucharist — Holy Communion will be limited to the Host (wafer only) and will be distributed by the Priest at your pew. A Deacon will provide communion to those seated in the parish hall and reserved parking area at the appropriate time.

Exiting the Church - Parishioners, upon completion of worship, are asked to exit the rear doors of the church from the back row to the front, maintaining required social distancing requirements. Everyone is asked to remove their service bulletins from the pew upon exiting the church. A trash receptacle for their disposal will be located at the rear of the church.

Every measure possible is being taken to ensure a safe return to congregational worship. Prayer Books, Hymnals, and other worship aids have been removed from the church to prevent the spread of germs. Printed bulletins will not be shared by the 9:00 and 11:00 AM congregations. Most importantly, all pews, doors, etc., will be wiped down with a quality disinfectant after each service.

Remember, we must all do our part. Failure to do so may make someone else afraid to attend our next worship service.

Coffee Hour - The serving of food and beverages will remain suspended until further notice.

Effective Wednesday, June 3rd, 2020, 10:30 AM services will also reopen for congregational worship. Protocols will be the same as those specified for Sunday worship. No evening services at this time.
